#### MISSION STATEMENT

#### THE SCHOOL DAY

The school day begins at 9.00am for all children. However, we encourage pupils to be at school for 8.45am to take part in our 'Daily Mile' activity. Parents are responsible for their children until a teacher arrives in the playground at 8:45am. School ends at 3.15pm.

AFTER SCHOOL CLUB runs from 3.15pm to 6.00pm, Mondays to Thursdays.

#### On Fridays, school finishes at 1:30pm.

At the end of the school day all children are expected to line up in an orderly manner in the playground, where a teacher will ensure that they are collected by their parents or guardians.

Parents/Guardians are expected to collect their children on time each day. Parents who are continually late in collecting their children will be asked to discuss the matter with the Headteacher.

Parents who need to collect their children before the end of school <u>must</u> contact the office in advance.

#### SCHOOL FEES

These are outlined on a separate sheet within this prospectus. Fees are payable in advance at the commencement of each term and are reviewed annually.

#### **DEPOSIT**

Parents are required to make a deposit of 50% of the term's fees for each child on admission. This amount is in addition to the regular fees to be paid and is refunded at the end of the child's tenure at Hyland House School, provided there are no outstanding debts.

#### WITHDRAWALS

A term's notice, in writing, of the intention to withdraw a child is required. In the absence of such notice, a term's fee is payable. Even when there is the possibility of withdrawal, provisional notice must be given.

#### **COMPLAINT PROCEDURE**

If a parent is unhappy about a particular matter, they are to present the case to the class teacher. If the parent feels that the matter has not been satisfactorily resolved, then the matter should be referred to the Headteacher. The Headteacher will then make every effort to bring the matter to a speedy conclusion. However, if the matter is still unresolved the Headteacher is required to bring it to the attention of the School Board.

We have a clear Complaints Policy which can be obtained from the school office.



#### **CODE OF CONDUCT**

The aim of our School is to provide a liberal Christian education, which recognizes and develops the potential of every pupil, within a caring, supportive and friendly environment, thus helping our pupils in their preparation to become full and effective citizens.

#### PARENTAL CODE OF CONDUCT

#### Parents should:

- Make positive and helpful comments
- Show respect to our staff, be polite and courteous
- Discuss any concerns/issues with the class teacher first
- Comply with the ethos of the school

- Discipline another parent's child
- Use offensive or threatening language to or about others, including children, parents and the community

#### **OUR CHARTER FOR STAFF AND PUPILS**

#### We should all:

- Speak with care and consideration and never directly refuse any reasonable request.
- Listen carefully to all instructions, opinions, questions and queries.
- Fulfil our work commitments to the best of our ability.
- Arrive at lessons on time and with the correct equipment.
- Behave in a way that is conducive to effective teaching and learning.
- Enhance our working environment by treating the school buildings and surroundings with respect and due care.
- Observe the policies in a consistent manner.
- Be familiar with and ensure compliance with the Code of Good School Practice.



#### CODE OF GOOD SCHOOL PRACTICE

#### Appearance

- School Uniform or P.E Uniform to be worn, with all garments marked with the owner's name.
- Jewellery is not allowed.
- Hair is to be tidy, not obviously dyed and not in an extreme style that would be considered inappropriate for school. Boys are to have their hair cut in a short, neat style, that can accommodate the school cap.
- Gum chewing is strictly forbidden in school.
- Wear the correct uniform and wear it properly on the way to and from school.

#### Safety and Good Order within School

Considerate and courteous behaviour at all times is the overriding principle within school:

- Be polite to your fellow pupils, your teachers, your midday assistants, office staff, caretakers, and visitors to the school.
- When moving about the school, keep to the left. There are places within school that become very congested at certain times. Improve the situation by not pushing, shouting and barging into each other. Hold doors open for other people and do not allow doors to close behind you in anyone's face. Queue in an orderly manner and do not push in.
- Leave other people's property alone and take care of furniture in classrooms. Do not put your feet on chairs or draw on tables and walls. Do not damage displays or equipment. You are trusted to behave with consideration, even when you are not being supervised.
- Litter can be a huge problem, but it could so easily be overcome by EVERYONE using the litter bins provided and not dropping rubbish anywhere.
- Take care of your belongings and do not leave valuable items unattended.

#### **OUTSIDE SCHOOL**

Your behaviour in public should bring credit to yourselves and the school. Act with courtesy and consideration on buses and trains. Queue in an orderly fashion and never drop litter.



#### **CONDITIONS AND SANCTIONS**

If we respect each other's rights and this code, there should be no need for sanctions. However, some rules are necessary, and sanctions are there for those who have let themselves and the school down:

• Pupils who continue to behave in an unacceptable way may be excluded from School. This happens in cases of physical violence and other serious abuse, violence of any kind and vandalism.

The most important rule of all is that we expect our students to always behave well inside and outside school, in a way which will bring honour and credit to themselves and show courtesy and consideration for other people.

We have clear lines of referral, both academic and pastoral, for dealing with indiscipline; various sanctions are applied, depending on the offence. Serious cases are few and far between. We ask parents to support us in ensuring that high standards of discipline and behaviour are maintained.

#### ANTI – BULLYING POLICY

Bullying is repeated behaviour which makes other people feel uncomfortable or threatened, whether this is intended or not. The aim of our anti-bullying policy is to clarify for pupils and staff that bullying is always unacceptable. We wish to encourage an environment where independence is valued, and individuals can flourish without fear. Every pupil has the right to be safe and happy in school, and to be protected when vulnerable. It is important that we create an atmosphere in the school where pupils who are being bullied, or others who know about it, feel that they will be listened to and believed, and that action taken will be swift but sensitive to their concerns. We have a detailed policy which is available from the office.

#### **RACE EQUALITY**

As a school community, we celebrate the richness of racial diversity in our pupils. Staff and pupils experience multi-cultural activities in many of their subjects which help them develop understanding and sensitivity. As a member of our school, we expect them to have an open mind to the variety of races and cultures. Any prejudice, racial intolerance or stereotyping is completely unacceptable, and will be dealt with appropriately.



#### ATTENDANCE AND FAMILY HOLIDAYS

Good attendance and punctuality are vital in order to help pupils achieve their full potential from school life. Pupils, parents and teachers at the school, work together to achieve this. Every absence, for whatever reason, must be explained in a letter sent with the pupil on the day of return.

The school year commences in September and there are three terms, each approximately twelve weeks. A school Calendar is sent to parents at the commencement of each year and a copy is on our school website. We request that parents try to arrange family holidays during school holidays so that the children may gain the greatest benefit from their education. If parents <u>must</u> take their children outside of normal school holidays, a letter to the Headteacher <u>must</u> be sent in.

#### **HOMEWORK**

Homework is an important part of our school's approach to help pupils work, think, and learn on their own. Parental support is vital in seeing that homework is done conscientiously and in the best possible conditions. Parents are asked to co-operate by seeing that their child does the homework carefully and by signing the homework diary. Homework timetables are sent home at the beginning of each school year so that parents know what is expected of their child. The purposes of homework are:

- To develop the ability to work alone.
- To be self-motivating and well-organized
- To develop the skills of researching, organizing and presenting appropriate work on a given theme or topic to extend or prepare for class work.
- To encourage the habit of reading
- To develop the habit of regular work at home so that good routines are established in readiness for life in secondary school.
- To challenge each individual student with appropriate work.

#### **RELIGIOUS EDUATION AND COLLECTIVE WORSHIP**

We believe that this is the most important subject in the curriculum. It is the teaching of Religious Education that makes our school different from other schools. It is through the study of the Bible that children gain knowledge of Christ and His love for them and all mankind.

Whole school assemblies are conducted regularly, but not on Tuesday mornings, when swimming takes place at 9am. Each class has the opportunity to lead out in assembly.



Class worships are conducted in the classrooms on Tuesdays. It is important we begin each day with God.

#### Week of Prayer

Every Spring Term we devote a Week to Spiritual Emphasis. Children and teachers look forward to this week. It is a time of Spiritual refreshing when we seek to be drawn closer to the Lord Jesus. Our School Chaplain or visiting Pastor usually conducts the programme.

Children are given the opportunity to share their faith with members of the Community. During our Harvest Festival our children provide monetary gifts to the 'Stoke Newington Welfare Department' who feed the homeless every Wednesday.

#### HOME/SCHOOL COMMUNICATIONS

Parents are welcome to contact us at any time. They should telephone or write in advance to ensure that the appropriate member of staff is available to see them. Parent/Teacher Consultation Evenings are arranged for each child to discuss their progress. Parents receive regular newsletters from the Headteacher. Parents should make sure that the school has up-to-date contacts in the case of emergencies.

#### **DATA PROTECTION ACT**

We have a clear Data Protection Policy which can be obtained from the school office.

#### SAFEGUARDING AND CHILD PROTECTION POLICY

We have a clear Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy which can be obtained from the school office.

#### **ORGANISATION**

The school consists of an Early Years Foundation Stage class, an Infant class and two Junior classes; and within this framework, the children progress according to their ability.

While high academic standards are aimed at and achieved, our main purpose is to help each child to do his/her best and to enjoy a full and satisfying education at each stage of his/her development.

At the age of eleven, the children have the opportunity (subject to entrance tests) to be transferred to our Adventist secondary school: Stanborough Secondary School (Watford) or Eden High (West London); but parents are free to make their own choice of secondary education.



#### ADMISSION

Since September 2019, we admit children at the age of 2 years where they join our Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) classes.

Parents who desire their child/children to be registered should fill in an application form and return this to the Secretary at the school. Parents and children will be invited to attend an interview during the term prior to admission.

## <u>A registration fee is payable (see enclosed application</u> <u>form), which is not refundable, and should be sent in</u> <u>with each application form. The fee does not</u> <u>automatically secure a place for any child and is</u> <u>purely an administrative cost.</u>



### SCHOOL CURRICULUM

#### **Mathematics**

We aim to help our pupils to enjoy and develop an understanding of Mathematics as they learn the subject. Pupils must be taught to use and apply mathematical skills. There are five main areas of mathematics: Number, Algebra, Measurement, Shape and & Space Data Handling. These areas are interlinked and there are also links with other subject areas, e.g. Science. Some teaching is cross-curricular. Emphasis is also placed on the learning of tables and basic mathematical rules, as well as the use of calculators.

#### <u>English</u>

English comprises Reading, Writing (including Handwriting and Spelling) Speaking and Listening skills. It is necessary that children develop the basic skills in English that will enable them to tackle the other subjects of the curriculum with confidence.

#### Reading

There is a wide a selection of fiction and non-fiction books. There is a careful selection of books in the library as well as for classrooms.

The main reading scheme is "Reading 360". Children are not allowed to take these books home. They are, however allowed to take home books from parallel reading schemes and from the library. We encourage children to take home books to enjoy with the members of their family. Parents/Guardians need to check with the class teacher with regards to the days when books are taken home and when they should be returned.

A record of children's reading is kept in all classes and parents are asked to sign and comment on their children's reading.

#### **Science**

We have two fully equipped science laboratories in the main school building, one for the Infant pupils and one for the Junior pupils. Each class follows science topics in line with the National Curriculum. The four main areas of National Curriculum Science are Experimental and Investigative Science, Life Processes and Living Things, Materials and their Properties and Physical Processes.

The teaching of Science involves children engaging in investigative and experimental work. They actively interact with their environment, handling materials in their investigations. They are encouraged to explore, observe, make deductions, devise tests, hypothesize and test their ideas. Children are given opportunities to communicate their findings to different audiences in a variety of ways. These include written reports, drawings, diagrams etc.



#### Computing

We have a fully equipped IT Suite, housing 22 Apple computers, as well as a whiteboard and Apple TV in all classrooms. The school also provides each pupil, from Year 1 upwards, with an iPad to use in school to enhance their learning. The school follows the National Curriculum. We also use the 'Discovery' scheme to teach Coding.

#### <u>Music</u>

This is an important part of the school curriculum. Pupils are introduced to a variety of composers and their music. Pupils are taught a variety of unison songs, for different occasions. In addition to the National Curriculum, we offer recorder and keyboard lessons co-ordinated by a specialist tutor. We also have a vibrant school choir.

#### Swimming

Swimming lessons are given once per week, all year round by a qualified instructor at the Tottenham Leisure Centre. This applies to children in years 2, 3, 4, 5 & 6. Fees are payable for this activity, please see separate sheet.

Swimming is a life skill and is therefore a compulsory part of the curriculum. The only reasons for which a child may be excluded from Swimming are as follows:

- Contagious infections
- Eczema (very severe cases)
- Girls who are menstruating on that day

Excuses such as colds or flu are not acceptable. If your child does have the flu he or she should not be at school.

#### First Aid

For the benefit of your child every member of staff is a qualified First Aider
